23	RESOLVED, BY THE COUNCIL OF THE DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA, That this
24	resolution may be cited as the "Sense of the Council Supporting the Establishment of Amigos
25	Park Resolution of 2021".
26	Sec. 2. The Council finds that:
27	(1) The Mount Pleasant neighborhood became home to a large population of Central
28	American immigrants beginning in the 1970s and the 1980s, particularly Salvadoran residents
29	fleeing conflict and establishing communities in the District of Columbia.
30	(2) Throughout the following decades, these residents created in Mount Pleasant a hub of
31	Salvadoran and Central American community organizing and culture, including tenant
32	organizing, musical performance, restaurants, grocers, retail, and healthcare clinics.

(3) The intersection of Mount Pleasant Street, N.W., and Kenyon Street, N.W. – colloquially known as "La Esquina" – became a central gathering place for many Latino/Hispanic residents.

- (4) La Esquina and the "Esquineros" who frequent it were the subject of a Smithsonian Folklife exhibition in 2018, which notes that the space is used by many to "share stories of life back home in Latin America, journey[s] to D.C., and life in the Latino barrio... In fact, many consider this corner a second home."
  - (5) For many years, Esquineros and other residents have advocated for an improved park space at the northwest corner of Mount Pleasant Street, N.W. and Kenyon Street, N.W., referred to as "Amigos Park".
  - (6) In 2017, the nonprofit Green Spaces for DC helped residents and advocates to incorporate an "Amigos Park" organization to advance the cause of "turning the small, fenced greenspace located at northwest corner of Mr. Pleasant and Kenyon Streets N.W. into a public park."
  - (7) The establishment of Amigos Park has been supported by two unanimous votes of ANC 1D.
- (8) Mount Pleasant Village has written in support of the establishment of Amigos Park.

  In a letter from October, 2019, they state: "We would value the creation of this park for the
  benefit of our 200 members and for the benefit of our Mount Pleasant Community. Currently,
  there is no location to stop and rest along the length of Mount Pleasant Street once one leaves
  Lamont Park to the north. Many of our members would welcome such a place to stop, to meet
  and to engage with our community outside our homes...Many of our members have lived in

Mount Pleasant for decades, and with those years have come the appreciation of the special diversity of our neighborhood across ages and cultures."

- (9) District Bridges, a nonprofit organization that manages the Mount Pleasant Main Street, has also expressed strong support for a formalized park space. "We envision this park to be a place where residents can exercise, rest in the shade, children can play, and the community can come together. This space is currently underutilized, and it would benefit all the residents of Mount Pleasant."
- (10) The space in question is approximately 1700 square feet and is bisected by a fenced-in planting area that often poses a rodent and trash problem. The many residents who gather at the corner do not have access to this fenced-in area. Approximately 740 square feet belongs to the adjacent private property owner, a 7-11 store. The remaining 960 square feet are DDOT public parking.
- (11) The private property owner has indicated that they are interested and willing to collaborate with the community and District government to make better use of the space in question.
- (12) The area is covered by an existing Clean Team that is able to absorb any additional maintenance needs created by a park space.
- (13) In addition to maintenance being covered by existing resources, there is a great deal of community interest in making improvements to the space, which would be accomplished through a formalized "Friends Of" agreement with the District.
- (14) Despite the overall cost to the District being de minimis, without a client agency, the Department of General Services has declined to engage in lease negotiations for the space. The

Department of Parks and Recreation has indicated that the space is too small to be considered for their portfolio.

Sec. 3. It is the sense of the Council, that creating a legitimate park or plaza space at the northwest corner of Mount Pleasant Street, N.W. and Kenyon Street, N.W. constitutes a significant opportunity to improve a long-standing neighborhood gathering space, to meet the needs of many Mount Pleasant residents, and to treat the District's Central American immigrant community with the dignity it has long deserved. The District government should use its existing FY21 resources to engage in negotiations with the property owner and the established Amigos Park organization to establish a lease or other agreement that allows the fencing to be removed and future improvements to be made.

Sec. 4. The Council shall transmit a copy of this resolution, upon its adoption, to the Mayor and the Directors of the Department of General Services, Department of Parks and Recreation, and Department of Transportation.

Sec. 5. This resolution shall take effect immediately upon the first date of publication in the District of Columbia Register.
